# We are in a Penalty Shootout for the Planet

It's been nearly 20 years since the launch of Al Gore's documentary, An Inconvenient Truth. At the time, I was in a full-time teaching role, and schools were exploring the issues associated with managing our use of, and damage to, Planet Earth. I will forever remember witnessing the students watching the documentary, tears in their eyes and a hardening of their resolve. As a teacher, it is never easy watching children cry.

This year, Sunshine Coast Grammar School has been acknowledged for a 5-Star Sustainable Programs 2023 Award and it is a great honour for this valued Program to be recognised. Additionally, I know the greatest difference I can make as a school leader and teacher is to provide opportunities for the next generation to create the world they wish to see. The 2022 Mission Australia Youth Survey reported that the most important issue facing Australia's youth is The Environment. In the previous surveys, it was in the top 10, then the top five, and most recently the environment roared up the charts with a bullet!

In addition to our young people's voice, the Sunshine Coast Biosphere is one of five UNESCO biosphere regions in Australia and one of 748 biosphere regions globally, across 134 countries. Sunshine Coast Biosphere covers the total local government area and extends off the coast 3 nautical miles. We have committed to act locally and we have signed up globally. Small actions make a big difference.

*People, Planet and Progress* – the Purpose Program at Sunshine Coast Grammar School, dovetails out of the shared values of the UNESCO global program and the Sunshine Coast Council's commitment to our Biosphere Reserve.

Sunshine Coast Biosphere is a community of shared values, working together to live, work, learn and play sustainably towards a future we are proud of.

So why have we arrived at the penalty shootout without any tangible, uniform actions across all regions of the planet? John Doerr, investor, venture capitalist and philanthropist describes the time for urgent measures as now. He argues the economic benefits and outlines the measures to be embraced in his most recent book, *Speed and Scale*.

"Not only is there a moral imperative for solving climate change, the economic opportunities are profound. Entrepreneurs in the climate space will make billions, and many existing companies will transform themselves, if they haven't already, to take advantage of those opportunities." Following his research he concludes with the grim prognosis, "We've got to invest like our lives depend on it, because they do," Doerr said.

All the players in the game are lined up. This generation of school-aged children are universally committed, our Council is aligned with a Global program, and Sunshine Coast Grammar School's Purpose Program is a vehicle to uplift all people through education and action. From December this year, preparations will begin for a new building to emerge from the footprints of the P1 to P4 Primary classrooms. These new classrooms will help support us to meet the needs of our growing Primary School. It will be the second stage of the Primary building project which will ultimately lead to a reduction of our footprint for Primary classrooms.

At Sunshine Coast Grammar School, we have outstanding teachers, whose teaching practices support our desire to have clarity around learning knowledge and skills. This is currently occurring in all of our classrooms, but with the growth of our school, the need for new learning spaces provides us with new opportunities.

New classrooms will better support clear and explicit instruction with improved acoustics through integrated sound systems, centrally located digital interactive boards and rooms with natural light. Our flexible modular furniture, along with these modern classroom features, will provide interactive learning environments that stimulate critical thinking, problem-solving and creativity, fostering a deeper understanding of the subject matter. The organisation of classroom resources will be supported through integrated storage systems and display areas, ensuring there is order and structure to learning spaces.

The new buildings will further support the personal needs of students. From the basic needs of storage of student bags and other belongings away from the elements, as well as other environmental factors that bring a feeling of new beginnings and positivity.

Grounded in cognitive research, these innovative spaces are designed to optimise engagement, information retention for overall academic success.

## FUTURE CAFETERIA NOW UNDERWAY

The campus has been a hive of activity during this period, with construction for the new cafeteria building now in full swing. It is anticipated that the project will be completed in Semester Two next year.

The majority of the work already completed has involved the demolition of the old Uniform Shop and the installation of underground cabling and connections for services. During Term 4, we will witness the commencement of pilings and structures to the site.

Over the September School Holiday break, we added three additional Primary demountable classrooms. These classrooms are part of the next stage of the Primary Build, scheduled to commence in December 2023 with an expected completion date in January 2025. As part of this ongoing development, four existing primary classrooms (P1-4, currently known as the Year 2 classrooms) will be demolished in the next school holiday period.

We kindly request your patience and understanding during this upcoming period. While these construction and development projects are crucial for the growth and enhancement of our campus, they may make navigation around the school grounds somewhat challenging. We are committed to carefully managing and balancing these projects to ensure minimal disruption to our student's educational experience.

## **Visible Learning**

Learning with Purpose: Our Visible Learning Approach

Corwin Professional Learning Leader, David Whitehead was back on campus recently and discussed the best ways to support staff to embed the principles of Visible Learning ® in teaching programs and the classroom. Visible Learning is all about clarity in pedagogy and how it can impact students' learning. It provides learners with a clear vision and empowers them to reflect on their own learning and identify the next steps.

Our Vision for Learning is exemplified in all that we do and are at Sunshine Coast Grammar School and learning with purpose remains at the forefront of our direction. We continue to commit to Visible Learning practices and implement a number of strategies based on the work of Professor John Hattie. Contemporary professional development informs teacher practice and knowledge, to ensure students are engaged in learning and have a metacognitive understanding of classroom subject matter.

During our recent Student Free Day, staff engaged in research that relates to student ownership of learning. The professional learning session provided an insight into the four core components of a learner, and focused on practical examples, tools and strategies of how to develop visible learners in our school. It was an opportunity to reflect on what we have achieved in this space, as we look forward purposefully with passion and purpose, and continue to commit to Visible Learning practices and strategies.



As part of the professional development Secondary Teachers reviewed learning dispositions. Dispositions are like habits- they are the complex mix of behaviours, values, attitudes, feelings and cognitive stories which enable students to navigate their way when learning. A student disposed to learning is open, hopeful and ready to engage. Staff unpacked learner dispositions such as reflection, resilience, challenge and curiosity; particularly, identifying how students can develop in each of these areas, so they are best equipped to learn. Primary Teachers focussed on learning intentions and success criteria (how a student knows when and what they have learned). Teacher tools and reflection resources were evaluated to determine best practice in developing visible learners.

At Sunshine Coast Grammar School, we have a mindset for the future and a vision for powerful learning – creating ethical, responsible and caring citizens of the world. Professional growth days, such as 1 September, provide opportunities for our teaching staff to continue their own life-long learning, in order to foster students who are expert learners.

## From The Psychology Team

The Psychology Team at Sunshine Coast Grammar School has been busy the past 12 months establishing group-based programs in the Primary School, with plans for these to flow into the Secondary School in the future. Currently, four evidence-based programs have been utilised to enhance the social and emotional well-being of students, and to assist the growth of connections with peers. The programs include the Kimochis, Meet Your Amygdala, InterAct and Seasons for Growth.

Kimochis, which means 'feelings' in Japanese, aims to help Year 1-5 students understand and express their own emotions effectively. The children meet a series of characters that represent different personalities and temperaments, fostering emotional awareness and communication skills. The Kimochis website (https://www.kimochisway.com/) offers a wealth of information and free resources for parents to incorporate the messages into daily life and enhance effective communication of emotions.

Meet Your Amygdala is a skills-training program for Year 5-10 students to build resilience and manage anxiety. It is designed to reduce the overwhelming feelings young people experience as well as to normalise the experience of anxiety. Students learn a set of tools and strategies that can be used to help reduce anxiety inside and outside the classroom.

InterAct is a group program that focuses on social skills development through the use of games and drama-based activities. The activities focus on nonverbal and verbal communication; looking, listening and responding; working in pairs and working as a team. The sessions aim to increase children's social confidence and communication skills.

Seasons for Growth teaches children new ways of thinking and responding to change and loss. The emphasis is on understanding the effects of change, loss and grief, whilst developing skills in communication, decision making and problem-solving. The group also builds a peer support network, and helps increase self-confidence and self-esteem.

So far, the Psychology Team has received very positive feedback from students and families, and observed great progress in participating students. These groups are designed to expand students' resilience, and allow them to fully embrace life's challenges and opportunities. The Psychology Team plan to run these groups into the future, so please keep an eye out if you are interested in your child participating.

The Passion Projects are creative, fun, engaging and most of all impactful. It is another great addition to our community programs that build capacity and work towards a solutions-focused future.












### **Sunshine Coast Business Women's Awards 2023**

## **Primary Vegetable Garden**

In a world often consumed by technology and digital solutions, students in the Primary School have taken a step towards sustainable living by applying the principles of design thinking to create a vibrant school vegetable garden. Through a collaborative effort, students in Year 5 harnessed their imagination and enthusiasm to transform a neglected garden into a productive patch.

### The Seeds of Inspiration: Design Thinking in Action

Design thinking is a problem-solving approach that prioritises empathy, collaboration and creative ideation. Aspiring to make a tangible difference within their school environment, the enthusiastic group set out to design and implement a vegetable garden that would not only beautify the campus, but also promote sustainable practices and encourage healthy eating habits.

### **Empathy**

Before embarking on this design journey, students recognised the importance of gathering insights from their peers and teachers. They designed comprehensive surveys to gauge interest and gather feedback regarding the potential vegetable garden. The surveys posed questions about the willingness of students and teachers to utilise and contribute to the garden, as well as their preferences for types of vegetables to be cultivated.

The response to the surveys was overwhelmingly positive, reflecting the community's eagerness to embrace the initiative. Students and teachers alike expressed their enthusiasm for the project, recognising the educational and environmental benefits it could bring to the school. The survey results encouraged students and showed the importance of empathising with stakeholders in the design process.

#### **Ideation**

Students brainstormed creative ideas for the garden's layout, aesthetics and functionalities. Archways, plants, ground coverings, teaching areas and social spaces were all explored. Design concepts aimed to ensure the garden would be both visually appealing and practical for teachers and students. Some ideas were to be implemented immediately, while others were aspirational and will take further consultation.

#### **Prototyping**

To turn their ideas into reality, students created prototype designs in pairs and groups. This step allowed them to visualise their concepts and present ideas to peers and teachers. Some of the bigger structural design ideas have been presented to Mr Craig Angel and the Maintenance Team for their input. This will see further refinements and improvements to the space to better suit the community's' needs in the future.

### **Testing**

After a final joint design was created, the testing stage is now an ongoing process that throws students back into earlier stages of design thinking. As plants thrive, go to seed and get picked, constant readjustments need to be made.

Year 5 students have exemplified the transformative potential of design thinking in their journey to create a school vegetable garden. Through surveys, empathy, ideation, prototyping, testing and collaborative implementation, they have harnessed their creative energies to bring about a positive change within their school community. This remarkable project serves as a reminder that when young minds come together with passion and purpose, they can sow the seeds of innovation and cultivate a brighter, more sustainable tomorrow.



# THE POWER OF GROWTH: PLANTING POTATOES FOR POSITIVE CHANGE

# ♀ national science week

We wrapped up an eventful week with a bang as we celebrated National Science Week, engaging students from Primary to Secondary with innovative experiments and activities that ignited our students' curiosity and fostered innovation – a force that will drive future industries.

From balloon copters that unveil the principles of aerodynamics, to dry ice demonstrations and the highly anticipated Science Goes BOOM finale, the experiments explored scientific concepts that captivated students and ignited a passion for discovery and learning.

Thank you to our enthusiastic Science Department for conducting a series of engaging and fun experiments.











## EMPOWERING EDUCATION THROUGH INNOVATION

The Technology Department has embraced project-based learning as an effective tool to foster critical thinking, problem-solving skills and creativity among students. Hands-on learning projects are used to engage students and empower them with real-world applications of theoretical knowledge. Apart from the many units encompassing innovation in the Digital Technology field such as drone programming, we have three such projects in Design Technology - solar boat research, design and prototyping in Year 8 Design Technology, eco lamps and CO2 dragsters in Year 9 Design Technology.

Solar boats are an excellent example of innovative student projects that combine engineering, renewable energy and environmental awareness. These projects involve researching, designing and building boats that run entirely on solar energy, and culminate in race challenges at the end of the unit. This project encourages students to think beyond conventional methods, and pave the way for cleaner and greener modes of transportation for the future.

Eco lamps involve designing and creating lamps utilising LED lights. Students design the lamp using materials and design concepts that have minimal effect on the planet and learn the benefits of LEDs (light-emitting diodes) which have an advantage over other light sources due to their longer life, much lower power consumption and smaller size.

CO2 dragsters provide students with the opportunity to investigate, design and build prototype vehicles powered entirely with CO2. Students research aerodynamics and design vehicle bodies to reduce drag and thus reduce fuel consumption.





The benefits of these project-based learning activities extend beyond the immediate knowledge acquired during the process. These projects provide interactivity and engagement, collaboration and critical thinking amongst our students, and offer real-world applications and a connection with sustainable factors for a future shaped by technological advancements and environmental concerns.



### THE UNISC EVTOL PROJECT

(ELECTRIC VERTICAL TAKE-OFF AND LANDING

An amazing opportunity has emerged for a small group of Grammar students to be part The UniSC eVTOL Project. The student team is aiming to design and build an eVTOL aircraft that can be used for various applications, including personal transport, surveillance, logistics and freight.

Students will be offered an unparalleled project-based learning (PBL) experience where they gather to collaborate with some of the brightest young minds in science, engineering, technology, arts and mathematics.

Max Mays-Duncan, Hugo Collins and Taha Salman will have the opportunity to represent Grammar in the early stages of the project. The project is being driven by one of our first Future Tech Series speakers, Mr Tim Kelly.



Students are separated into five groups; being mentored by industry leaders and driving the system forward:

- Aerostructures
- · Business Systems Hugo
- Electrical and Software Max & Taha
- Flight Systems
- Manufacturing

The goal: To have an aircraft flying for the 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games.



Another new initiative in 2023 has been the Future Tech Series. The series is a chance for students, parents and staff to find out about emerging opportunities in the future technology space. We were extremely fortunate earlier this year to hear from two industry leaders in Mr Tim Kelly (Internationally experienced Aeronautical Engineer) and Mr Luc Pettett (a private investor who loves all things technology) who gave the audience some unique insights.

Our next evening in the series is Tuesday 10 October when we hear from Mr. Noah Wasmer (converting utes into electric vehicles) and Mr Owen Bowling (Al assisted fitness opportunities).






















## GLOBAL CONNECTIONS – NEAR AND FAR

Innovation at Grammar Early Learning Centre is creating a flexible learning environment that is enriching for children of all ages. Our Educators ensure that children are given the opportunity to grow, discover and be creative in their play, and they allow children to explore the outdoor environment to appreciate the natural world.


With the implementation of a worm farm at the Centre, children have had the opportunity to develop life skills by caring for their environment. This program has led us to develop our sustainability practices. We are currently working with Sunshine Coast Council to become more sustainable as a centre and our goal is to start a community garden.

We are embedding a culture of innovation in technology to actively engage and educate our early learners. We use an active technology approach that aligns with the Early Years Learning Framework (EYLF) to increase access to meaningful and thoughtful learning opportunities. Intentional, hands-on and play-based learning experiences are a critical priority in our daily program.

Children at Grammar ELC have the access to utilise iPads and interactive whiteboards for a variety of learning experiences including yoga, literacy, creative expression and Early Learning Languages Australia (ELLA). This language app allows children to learn Japanese through play, literacy and numeracy activities. The interactive whiteboards were recently used by the Kindy Two class who have been reading a story about a seal that is often seen at the Sydney Opera House. They accessed images and information about the Sydney Opera House and the Sydney Harbour Bridge using Google Earth.

Our Educators consistently reflect on their practices and develop their skills through professional development opportunities, including Early Start Australia, Between the Flags and Making Learning Visible. This continual growth allows Educators to be innovative in their practices as they use their new skills to build learning spaces to guide the children during their play and learning.
