












A Fresh Chapter: A new look for our 2024 Magazines

In Week 4, 62 Senior Biology students took the opportunity to attend a field excursion to Wurtulla Beach and Point Cartwright, and what a wonderful day it was! The sun was certainly shining despite the forecast for rain. Lead by Mrs Haywood, Mr Bessell, Mr Boyd and Mrs Wheeler, students set out with the intention to apply their understanding of biodiversity and the structure of ecosystems and investigate interactions between abiotic and biotic components, in order to make spatial and temporal comparisons between these two stunning locations.

The first stop was Wurtulla Beach. Observations and measurements were performed to determine species diversity through a sand dune ecological community, using quadrats along a line transect. This beautiful environment allowed students to study the gradual change in species present and their abundance, whilst relating this to changes in the abiotic environment (such as temperature, wind speed, humidity and sub-soil texture). From the hardy Spinifex grass, Pigface and Goat's Foot species of the windswept incipient dunes, through the fluttering Horsetail She-Oak dominated foredunes, an increased richness of plant and animal life became apparent, including a variety of birds, and Native Cherry, Cabbage Tree Palm, Cottonwood and Snake Vines.

The second stop was Point Cartwright. Using the same sampling methods, students explored the marvellous rocky shore, observing a wide variety of marine species in the rockpools and across the rocky platforms. These fascinating organisms simply leave you in awe, gently reminding us of the incredible place in the world that we are so fortunate to call home; the spectacular Sunshine Coast. The excitement and curiosity of the students were clear as they shared their findings of an array of life. The mesmerising movements of the Black-ringed Sea Hare as it fed on the red and green algae in the rockpools, along with the kaleidoscope of colour afforded by sea cucumbers, anemones, coral, Green Zoanthid, a range of molluscs, and more, allowed students to connect their learning with this remarkable marine ecosystem. It was most certainly a day to remember.















Year 8 Geographers -

AUTHENTIC LEARNING EXPERIENCE IN THE FIELD

During Term 4, the Year 8 Geography classes spent a day at Buddina and Maroochydore. They conducted fieldwork on the beach to investigate coastal features such as sand dunes and processes such as longshore drift. Students were able to observe, sketch and critique the various sand management techniques at the mouth of the Maroochy River. Back at school, they used their findings to write field reports which showcased their graphing and mapping skills, and allowed them to propose and justify alternative coastal management methods.

The students enjoyed being out in the field to see Geography in action and to engage in some authentic learning, offering real-world solutions for our community.



FROM BYSTANDERS TO UPSTANDERS VIA HOLOCAUST EDUCATION

In Term 4, the Year 10 Modern History students had the amazing opportunity to work with Courage to Care, an organisation that informs and educates Australian students about the dangers of prejudice, racism and discrimination, by looking at the experiences of those who lived through the Holocaust. As part of this, students were able to listen to Peter Baruch, a Holocaust survivor, speak about his escape from war-torn Poland as a young boy. The students heard about the many people who showed courage and integrity in order to save his life and then, in smaller groups. considered how they could apply such 'upstander' values to their own lives today. The students were exceptional in terms of their maturity, engagement and contributions, and the organisers were highly impressed by the open and honest attitude of the students, with their thoughtful and insightful responses during the workshop facilitation.



QUEENSLAND HISTORY TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION HISTORICAL WRITING COMPETITION

Each year, the Queensland History Teachers' Association invites students across the state to enter a piece of their History work from the school year. In 2023, they received over 350 entries in 17 categories, from Years 7 to 12. Two of our students achieved exceptional results. Lila Collins (Year 9) was presented with a Highly Commended award for her feature article about a World War I battle and soldier. Zara Kerin-Bird (Year 11) had entries in three categories this year and deservedly won awards in all of these. In the Year 11 Ancient History category, she was awarded a Highly Commended certificate, in the Year 11 Ancient History Independent Source Investigation category, she placed second in the state, and for her Modern History piece on the significance of Faith Bandler in the Aboriginal Civil Rights movement, she won the award for the best First Nations essay in the state of Queensland which in itself is an amazing achievement. Congratulations to both of these outstanding History students.

Atomu found guidance in his formative years at Sunshine Coast Grammar School, with structure and mentorship playing a pivotal role after the passing of his father in Year 8 (2000). Throughout his schooling years, Atomu set his sights high with a dream of becoming the World Number One Golfer.

After graduating in 2004, Atomu temporarily veered off course from his dream of becoming a professional golfer. At the age of 24 and facing a financial crossroads, Atomu had to reimagine his goals and his journey toward becoming a professional golfer recommenced.

Opting for a Golf Traineeship at his home club, Horton Park (now Maroochy River), Atomu mastered every aspect of the golfing world, from club repairs to running a Golf Club.

Graduating as an Australian PGA member in 2013, he set his sights on the global stage and pursued professional golf in Charlotte, North Carolina.

The experience abroad of competing with seasoned players in the E-Golf Tour proved challenging but invaluable. Undeterred by setbacks, Atomu returned home to refocus and found his new passion for coaching at Pelican Waters Golf Club. Under the guidance of Golf Coach, Grant Field, he discovered the joy of helping others enjoy golf and expanded the Junior Program and hosted clinics for beginners and ladies.

Identifying a common frustration among golf enthusiasts and to improve on timely feedback during practice, Atomu enlisted an Executive Coach to help develop a revolutionary model for golf coaches. Atomu's vision was a 24/7 golf facility equipped with cutting-edge technology, ensuring accessibility for enthusiasts regardless of weather.

When the pandemic struck in 2020, Atomu faced a double challenge, losing his coaching contract and securing funds to launch his envisioned Golf Facility. His family made a bold move, selling their family home to finance the Sunshine Coast Golf Centre, which opened its doors on 1 August 2020.

Powered by TrackMan, Sunshine Coast Golf Centre now boasts two simulator bays and offers a unique golfing experience.
