THE SCHOOL'S MASTER PLAN REVIEW

The School's Master Plan review was completed and will be finalised late 2024. The Primary School Stage 1 and Cafeteria/ Café/Student Services projects commenced construction.

The PMSA commenced Strategic Planned Workshops in March/ April and proposed a vision for 10, 20 and 30 years. The Plan will be approved by the PMSA Board in 2024.

The school's five yearly NSSAB (Non-State Schools Accreditation Board) review was completed in March.

Inaugural Grammar Long Lunch was initiated by P&F to bring our Grammar parents together after many years of not having an outlet for this, and the event was a tremendous success with many new friends made.

DA VINCI DECATHLON


Known as Australia's most demanding multi-disciplinary academic competition was held over three intensive days. At Grammar, we believe in nurturing young minds to reach their fullest potential and the da vince Decathlon perfectly aligns with this philosophy. Our regional teams celebrated outstanding success and were invited to compete at the State Championships held at Nudgee College. The theme was 'Unity', and it was heartening to witness the unity amongst our students as they tackled a diverse range of tasks. We are immensely proud of our Grammar Decathletes who excelled in the State competition, earning an impressive 17 academic awards. The results were a testament to their hard work, dedication, and problem-solving skills. Notably, our Year 11 team secured the coveted 1st place overall for the State Decathlon, showcasing their exceptional talent.

FUTURE TECH SERIES

Future Tech Series was a new initiative this year, providing students, parents, and staff a chance to find out about emerging opportunities in the future technology space. We were extremely fortunate to hear from transport industry leaders working towards cleaner transport solutions, which gave us some unique insights.

ROAR PERFORMANCE

At Sunshine Coast Grammar School, our vision for the Roar Performance Program is to provide the framework for our aspiring student-athletes to pursue academic and sporting excellence and foster a healthy balanced lifestyle. We value strengths outside of the classroom and recognise the heavy training and competition commitments made by our students. With this in mind, the Roar Performance Program was launched in 2023 offering Academic Support, Athlete Development, Pathways and Personal Growth for our aspiring atheletes.











FRENCH INTERNATIONAL TOUR

After missing out on the France Tour due to COVID, Year 11 & 12 students were excited to visit Noumea, New Caledonia for a week during the Easter school holidays. This experience offered them an opportunity to travel to a tropical country and be fully immersed in the French language.

JAPANESE INTERNATIONAL TOUR

Five Year 11 students were fortunate to immerse themselves in the Japanese culture and language as they visited our Japanese sister school, Shohei, during the 2022/2023 Christmas holiday period. In July, we welcomed 24 Shohei students to our school for over two weeks, and both experiences sparked renewed enthusiasm in our Japanese classrooms.

GRAMMAR HELPING HANDS

2023 presented an array of very special opportunities to serve our community and, this year, our service programs worked on aligning to the 17 United Nations Sustainable Development Goals, providing a fantastic vision for the future as we worked to support people and planet.

Our Grammar Green Team showcased our environmental program by hosting our biggest beach clean to date, removing hundreds of kilograms of waste from local beaches.

As part of our friendship with Bloomhill Cancer Care, 30 students made a meaningful difference in our local community with a backyard makeover for Jacqui. We continued our support for Bloomhill with our annual carwash and op-shop donation day, now affectionately known as the Grammar Spring Clean.

We were fortunate to support The Shack Community Centre, Nambour, through our food donation drive, school backpack and hamper program. For the first time in Grammar's history, our Year 12 students spent a very cold night sleeping in the hall to raise funds for the homeless on the Sunshine Coast.

Our Odd Sock Day was a wonderful and very colourful way to raise funds to support an amazing organisation, Hummingbird House.

We had a huge turnout of volunteers at the Sunshine Coast Marathon festival, raising funds for a brilliant local charity, No More Fake Smiles.

Volunteers also lent a hand to the Disabled Surfing Association which was an incredible experience for all.


Cupcakes and donuts were the order of the day as we supported another worthy organisation, the Daniel Morcombe Foundation.


Beyond our shores, Grammar continued to support and sponsor students in Zambia through our Rainbow House.

I am often asked what is the secret sauce that goes into creating the culture at Grammar, the magic in the magical

black box of Sunshine Coast Grammar School. Why does this school evoke such a strong loyalty and commitment? Loyalty that was demonstrated on Foundation Day with a remarkable 60% of our Foundation Prep cohort as Lifelong Learners – 30 of the original 50. Lastly, I wanted to share my thoughts and reflections on honouring our founders, foundational Principals and leaders, and additionally acknowledge the extra lesson that this year has taught us. Primary School

At Sunshine Coast Grammar, our Primary School curriculum is designed to cultivate curiosity and foster confident, capable, and creative learners. We nurture students' sense of wonder through engaging, real-life, and personalised learning approaches, helping them grow as thinkers, problem solvers, collaborators, self-managers, communicators, and researchers.

Our curriculum focuses on Literacy and Numeracy, ensuring students are well-prepared for future challenges. Collaboratively planned and delivered by individual class teachers, it covers the Australian Curriculum learning areas: English, Mathematics, Science, Humanities and Social Sciences, The Arts, Technologies, and Health and Physical Education. Specialist teachers enhance this with lessons in Christian Studies, Visual Art, Performing Arts, Drama, and Physical Education from Prep to Year 6, and Languages (French and Japanese) in Years 4 to 6.

We encourage academic grit, a growth mindset, and enthusiasm for learning. Mistakes are seen as learning opportunities, and we emphasise attitude, effort, hard work, and persistence for personal success. Students leverage technology to research, create, and personalise their learning. Our Grammar Education Community Online (GECO) provides parents access to curriculum information and their child's learning experiences.

We also offer SOAR extension opportunities, GATEWAYS Challenges, da Vinci Decathlon, Year 6 Debating, and a diverse range of co-curricular activities.

We are committed to creating a nurturing and stimulating environment where every student can excel from the earliest years of their education, inspiring young learners to engage with enthusiasm and purpose, and empowering them to make meaningful learning decisions.



Secondary School

At Sunshine Coast Grammar, we have an unwavering commitment to empower each student to strive for distinction in all that they do.

Our purpose, being to inspire our Grammar community to live with passion and purpose, enables each student to make effective learning and assessment decisions so they can aspire to achieve success in their academic studies.

To achieve this, our curriculum equips students with the knowledge, understanding and skills necessary to be able to learn, contribute to and shape their world now and in the future.

Our curriculum programs are designed to provide dynamic and immersive learning experiences for all students to explore and challenge themselves, to embrace change, and to investigate new ways of thinking and working.

Our Year 7 to 10 students have embraced the Australian Curriculum enthusiastically, exploring a wide range of topics, in order to continue to develop their critical and creative thinking skills which form part of the 21st century skills needed to engage in contemporary learning. They have demonstrated a strong desire to enhance their problem-solving skills in all of their subjects and their pursuit of academic success has translated into intellectual curiosity and resilience, signifying what it means to be a Grammar learner.

Our Year 11 students are introduced to the Senior Assessment and Tertiary Entrance (SATE) experience and begin to forge their own diverse learning pathway in order to help them pursue their post-schooling options. The scope and scale of our curriculum offerings (28 General Subjects, 6 Applied Subjects, Diploma Level and Certificate Level courses) appropriately challenges our students to strive for excellence in their academic endeavours.

Our Year 12 students displayed remarkable focus, hard work, and unwavering commitment towards completing their Senior Schooling journey with us. From actioning the detailed feedback they received from their teachers, throughout their Internal Assessment, to culminating their study efforts to successfully complete their External Assessment examinations, the Year 12s have instilled the Grammar values and principles of what it takes to achieve success in their learning.

Therefore, we are proud of how each student, through their passion for learning, find purpose in their pursuit to be creative, ambitious and focused in their learning.



EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Sunshine Coast Grammar School provides outstanding Co-curricular opportunities for students. We offer a wide range of activities catering for students of all ages to further enrich the learning experience beyond the classroom. The emphasis is on participation, developing skills and enjoyment. A Co-Curricular showcase (Grammar Life Expo) is held at the beginning of the year where students can join one or more of the activities offered.

2023 HIGHLIGHTS

- Grammar had 120 District Representatives, 119 Regional Representatives, 37 State Representatives and three National Representatives.
- We also had a further 12 students selected in Australian squads through the community and club pathway.
- The inaugural Grammar Twilight Swimming District Carnival was highly successful for Years 3-12 students.
- A special congratulations to our First VI Girls Volleyball team who, in the space of one week, became the first-ever Grammar team to medal at the Sunshine Coast Schools' Competition in March winning bronze, and to then go on to win the Open A division in the SCISSA Competition.
- The ROAR Performance Program was introduced to support Grammar's aspiring Year 8-12 athletes, and with the commitment of 42 staff, this has been delivered extremely well.
- We thanked and farewelled Mrs Sue Glover for her dedication to 18 years of service to Grammar Sport.
- We had eight Sunshine Coast Grammar Pool Lifesaving Club members selected to represent Australia at the 2023 Commonwealth Championships in September in Windsor, Canada. The Grammar Open and Development Teams won their respective Commonwealth Championship titles.
- Grammar Rugby took a touring squad of 35 U16-U18 players to New Zealand for 10 days touring and playing around the South Island.
- For the first time, Grammar Water Polo entered into the Queensland all-schools water polo championship in the open boys' division and middle school girls' division. Both teams played brilliantly with middle girl's team narrowly missing out on the quarterfinals and our open boy's team winning silver.
- Grammar commenced a Model United Nations (MUN) program that works with UN Youth Australia. Through MUN, students research key global issues, make speeches, craft solutions and negotiate agreements in mock-security Council meetings. Grammar delegates competed in the Australia-wide Evatt Competition. Ten teams participated at regional level here at Grammar from which two teams qualified for the State Semi-Finals in Brisbane, and our Year 9/10 team was one of only 15 teams at the Queensland State Grand Final in Brisbane.

Pastoral Care and Wellbeing

Our Wellbeing Impact has focused on communicating and implementing strategies with students about relationships, friendships and wellness. Students have enjoyed experiences from incursions about their wellbeing through the URSTRONG Program, camps fostering independence and resilience, weekly lessons showcasing their learning assets and how they should lean into their strengths, to personal development lessons focusing on healthy habits and teamwork through weekly sports lessons.

The URSTONG program guides students to understand what healthy friendships are and reinforce that everyone deserves healthy "green zones" friendships that "feel good". We explicitly teach the four facts of friendship, helping children to learn that no friendship or relationship is perfect, it is normal to have disagreements and misunderstandings with our friends, but healthy friendships make us feel good a majority of the time. Our students unpack Friendship Fires and Mean in Purpose behaviour and how to address these. These shared understandings build our students' capacity to identify different types of conflict and make decisions on how to address these issues in the moment, whether it be through Talking it Out or using a Quick Comeback and reporting to an adult. Through our shared understanding and language, our students are building a concept of what respectful relationships look like and what they should expect when interacting with others.

Christian Education

- JOLT (Jesus Over Lunch Time) groups continued, and we experienced growth in numbers in Years 7-9.
- Successful Primary and Secondary Easter and Christmas Assemblies.
- Year 12 Valedictory Service JOLT students and Chapel Captains shared their faith journey.
- · Staff and Parent Prayer groups provided a wonderful foundation.
- Grammar Helping Hands meals delivered to families going through times of hardship.
- Staff Christianity Explored Course was completed for 10 Staff members, a very encouraging and bonding 7 weeks together.
- Christian Education Staff have worked to refine and further develop Christian Education programs from P-12.
- Chapel Services gave students and staff the opportunity to hear about the love of Jesus and our Christian values. 'Gideons International' gifted all Year 7 and 8 students with their own pocket-sized Bible.

Community Service

2023 presented an array of very special opportunities to serve our community once again. This year our service programs worked on aligning to the 17 United Nations Sustainable Development Goals, providing a fantastic vision for the future as we worked to support people and planet.

Our Grammar Green Team undertook to support our environmental program by hosting our biggest beach clean to date, removing hundreds of kilograms of waste from local beaches. Aviator, adventurer, author and shore bird enthusiast, Milly Formby, dropped by to share her passion for shorebirds during the year and was followed up with an animal encounter experience featuring snakes and a (thankfully) baby crocodile.

This year's support for our community was far reaching and once again we extended the hand of friendship to Bloomhill Cancer Care as we supported local lady, Jacqui, with a backyard makeover which included fence painting and landscaping. The 30 students who took part made a meaningful difference and showed true servant leadership.

We continued our support for Bloomhill with our annual carwash and our op-shop donation day, now affectionally known as the Grammar Spring Clean.

We were fortunate to support The Shack Community Centre in Nambour through our food donation drive, school backpack and hamper program, and for the first time in Grammar's history, our Year 12 students spent a (very cold!) night sleeping in the school hall raising funds to support those who are homeless on the Sunshine Coast.

2023 also saw Grammar supporting Hummingbird House and raising much needed funds through an Odd Sock Day – a wonderful and very colourful way to support this amazing organisation.

Once again, we had a huge turnout of volunteers at the Sunshine Coast Marathon festival. Funds raised this year through our service went to brilliant local charity, No More Fake Smiles. Our volunteering continued to the beach in 2023 as we lent a hand to the Disabled Surfing Association – an incredible experience for all involved.

Cupcakes and donuts were the order of the day as we supported the Daniel Morcombe Foundation with our Day for Daniel. The whole school came together to share in supporting this most worthy of causes.

Beyond our shores, Grammar continues to support and sponsor students in Zambia through Our Rainbow House and also in Timor – a country we once again had the pleasure of visiting again this year. Our 2023 tour to Timor was an unforgettable experience for the 29 students and 4 staff. The group visited friends in regional Maliana where we connected with local schools and English centres and where we continue to strengthen relationships. The group were fortunate enough to connect with many Timorese people who are working tirelessly to improve education and health standards. Our students returned with a fantastic outlook, resolve to continue to connect with our Timorese friends and a renewed appreciation of our many blessings in Australia.

Being recognised as one of Australia's most sustainable schools in 2023 is true recognition of the immense contributions by so many students and staff. We are fortunate to spend each day at Grammar with outward thinking, future focused people who share a real love and connection for our planet and its people.

Outdoor Education

Sunshine Coast Grammar School embarked on an exciting journey as it proudly marks its first year as a Duke of Edinburgh International Award Centre. The program is growing rapidly with 44 participants in 2023 and a new cohort to begin in 2024.

The program's dedication to holistic development has seen students actively engage in adventurous journeys on land and sea. They are learning new skills, whether mastering a musical instrument or honing culinary skills, giving back to the community through volunteering, and developing their physical skills all while working collaboratively to enhance teamwork and leadership qualities.

Special thanks must go to the dozens of assessors across the Sunshine Coast community who give up their time to support participants in their chosen fields. Mr Drew Miller, Ms Amanda Kuchel and Mrs Keshna Cranfield have also made an invaluable commitment to lead students on their Adventurous Journeys.

In just its first year as a Duke of Edinburgh International Award Centre, Sunshine Coast Grammar School has motivated students to embrace adventure and community service and helped them become more well-rounded individuals. The future looks promising for the participants as they complete their current award level and move on to the next one in 2024.

Parents and Friends Association

PARENT, TEACHER AND STUDENT SATISFACTION



The 'MMG Wheel' below reflects the average scores for all parents across key areas.


Parents noted 'very high' scores for 5 of the 12 areas and 'hight' scores for the remaining 7 areas. The overall score is 'high' (79%).




Expectations Met or Exceeded

2023 Sunshine Coast Grammar P-12 Parents - Expectations Met/Exceeded -Next 12 (n+489)




Expectations Met/Exceeded for Top 5 Most Important Areas

PMSA Employee Engagement Survey


2023 Sunshine Coast Grammar Staff Employee Engagement Data

Management of Non-Attendance

Parents and guardians are required to inform the School if their child will be absent from school for any reason as soon as possible.

If a student is late for school, they must sign in at Student Reception. If a student needs to leave school early, they will require a not from home to allow them to go out of class and to Student Reception. From there, a parent or guardian is required to sign out the student. For legal reasons, unless a parent or guardian is present, or a student has written permission to leave with another responsible adult, students will not be permitted to leave the school.

Attendance data and roll marking is captured at a classroom level by teachers via the TASS system.

Student absences are recorded daily by the Student Administration Officers for both Primary and Secondary Schools. Entries are date and time stamped.

Teaching staff have access to their student rolls via TASS (Teacher Kiosk). Rolls are marked in class at the beginning of the day and teachers do not have access to change the roll once marked.

Student Administration Officers, for both Primary and Secondary Schools, have access to the system to record student absences notified by the parents.

FINANCIAL INFORMATION

Although operated independently, Sunshine Coast Grammar School is owned by the Presbyterian and Methodist Schools Association (PMSA) and is a part of a single legal entity which is the PMSA.

The PMSA works to ensure that the group performance is achieved and optimised through a range of defined oversight and governance processes and prudent financial management.


All income that Sunshine Coast Grammar School receives from fees, donations, government grants and any other source is used entirely to operate and develop Sunshine Coast Grammar School.

As a part of the PMSA Group, Sunshine Coast Grammar School financial accounts and financial statements are prepared by the School's Business Manager and presented to and ratified by the PMSA's Finance and Audit Committee. These are independently audited by KPMG and then consolidated into the PMSA Group special purpose financial statements for reporting.

The PMSA's audited financial statements are prepared in accordance with all the relevant Australian Accounting Standards required by the Australian Charities and Not-For-Profits Commission (ACNC) Act 2012. Unless otherwise stated, these financial statements have been prepared on an accrual basis and in accordance with the historical cost convention.

Each year, PMSA schools pay an amount to the PMSA to cover PMSA group governing costs and collective expenses such as auditing, compliance, and other consolidated expenses for each of the schools.

A financial summary of the PMSA accounts is publicly available in the PMSA Annual Report on the PMSA website, and the consolidated audited financial statements are available on the ACNC registry. Accounting policies are published in these accounts.





FROM THE CHAPLAIN
